We were optimistic at the start of the year that everything was returning to normal, so in January we scaled down our food banks. June saw Uganda once again placed in strict lockdown, and so we increased our food relief provision again. By the end of 2021, the team in Uganda had distributed 1.2 million food parcels and provided COVID relief for 25,532 families.

Despite the strict lockdown and uncertainties, the Kids Club Kampala team remained resilient and optimistic. We are proud that throughout this difficult time we responded quickly, appropriately and completely guided by the community. As a result, we have been able to have a significant impact.

Our vital work providing food, educational materials and vital counselling support for vulnerable people during the COVID-19 crisis has strengthened our recognition, reputation and trust within Kampala's slums both during this time and for the future. 

Our COVID-19 Response in 2021

We were optimistic at the beginning of the year that the worst of COVID-19 was over. In January, we scaled back on our community food banks, which were established in 2020 to support vulnerable families who had lost work overnight at the start of lockdown.

By June however, COVID-19 cases were rising again, which resulted in Uganda being back in lockdown.

Kampala's slum communities were again confronted with incredible uncertainty. With work vanishing and food prices rising, families were once more facing malnutrition and starvation.

Having learnt from 2020, we were able to act quickly. Our incredible staff and volunteers knew what the community needed and worked tirelessly to distribute vital food packages to families that needed it.





Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, we have provided over 2.7 million food parcels to 58,030 vulnerable families.

Educating

At the beginning of 2021 we thought that schools in Uganda would reopen and children would be able to return to classroom-based learning. However, although schools did reopen in March, it was a short 12 weeks before the third wave of COVID-19 forced all schools to once again close their doors. Despite further disruption, our dedicated teachers ensured that all children on our education projects continued to learn.

106 children


received free daily education within 3 slum communities through our Encouraging Education Project (88 of them had never attended school and 18 had dropped out).

We welcomed small groups of children back to our education centres in March, but were forced to close due to lockdowns in June. The children had already faced over a year of disruption to their education, so to ensure they could continue to learn, our teachers quickly reverted back to homeschooling.

Each child was visited at least once a week in order to distribute educational materials, provide feedback on their assignments and check on general wellbeing. Our teachers also engaged with parents and provided them with advice on ways to keep their children safe, healthy and on track with their learning.

School Sponsorship

After a whole year of disruption, in the spring we finally saw sponsored children returning to school. The 158 children in primary school, secondary school and tech college were able to return, with the 20 children attending nursery continuing with home learning until the planned reopening of early years education in the summer. Since the June lockdown all sponsored children were supported with study materials so they could continue their learning at home.

After another difficult year for our sponsored children, we launched our Christmas Care Package Appeal to spread some joy and happiness over the festive season. Thanks to our child sponsors this was our most successful ever Christmas appeal, with 85 children receiving care packages.

Endings & Beginnings

In 2021, we saw 9 young adults graduate from our School Sponsorship programme. This is now the second year where the first children who entered this programme are graduating, and represents a significant period for our organisation as we have now seen children who have had their entire education funded by our supporters. We welcomed 8 new children onto this programme in 2021, and we're excited to see how these children grow into young adults with brighter futures, thanks to their sponsors' support.

Graduation Spotlight:

Despite the disruption caused by COVID-19, in 2021 we were still able to celebrate the graduations of 9 of our sponsored children. **4 graduated with A-Levels in subjects including:** Geography, Economics, Agriculture, Luganda, History, Maths, Art, Entrepreneurship, ICT & CRE. **5 graduated from technical college with vocational skills including:** motor mechanics, carpentry, hairdressing, cookery, joinery.

Jonah's story

Jonah* joined the School Sponsorship programme in 2015. After completing his O-Levels, he decided to undertake a motor mechanics internship at a local garage in Katanga. Jonah* is now 22 years old and is working full time at the same garage. He is able to help support his family and since taking the job his family have been able to move to a bigger home.

Protecting

Since 2020, we have seen a large rise in safeguarding cases. Children in Kampala's slums are more vulnerable to abuse, neglect and exploitation since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. A key focus area for us in 2021 was expanding our programmes which focus on protecting children, to strengthen the safety nets already in place.

Safeguarding

In 2021 we continued the expansion of our Safeguarding Programme within 10 slum communities. This programme recruits and trains safeguarding volunteers, who provide a pathway for reporting abuse in the slums, and deliver emergency care for children who are at imminent risk.

- Recruited and trained 50 new safeguarding volunteers
- Assessed 143 safeguarding concerns within communities
- Liaised with local leaders and police to handle
- 113 safeguarding cases

Referred 49 cases to counselling with our social workers

Eliot's* Story

Eliot* was just 3 years old when his father chased him, his mother and two siblings from their home in Katanga slum. The family spent three nights sleeping outside on the streets. Eliot's* mother had no money to pay for a safe space to stay. She reached out to a Kids Club Kampala volunteer who was able to help her get help from the police and arranged for a car to take them to her sister's house. Eliot* and his family are now living safely in their new home.





Wansala*+Najja's* Story

Brothers *Wansala (10) and *Najja (6) were living on the streets trying to find their parents when a good samaritan found them and took them to the local police. The children were then placed at the Ewafe home in October 2020. As the boys began to settle in, our tracing team started searching for their family. With the help of village elders, we were able to track down the brothers' family. The brothers were reunited with their family in January 2021.



Ewafe Project

This year the demand for our Ewafe Project has continued to rise, with more children than ever needing a safe space to call home.

- In 2021, we rescued a total of 33 children from abuse or abandonment
- Throughout the year, we successfully reintegrated
 19 children
- By the end of the year, there were 55 children staying at the home

In response to the rising demand for our Ewafe Project, this year the home has been undergoing a large expansion. With huge thanks to a generous benefactor we have been able to:

- Build an extra dormitory in order to welcome more children
- Open a therapy room and sickbay to care for the physical and psychological needs of the kids
- Construct brand new staff cottages so a member of Ewafe staff is always available for the children
- Acquire land for growing crops to increase the self sustainability of the Ewafe home
- Build a new kitchen to prepare meals for the additional children
- Purchase a brand new car to support the teams tracing families across the country








Samson* is our longest Ewafe resident, with our social workers really struggling to locate his family. For the last 6 years and 11 months, he has stayed with us at the Ewafe home. Samson* was able to get an education, clothing, love and care whilst staying with us. But finally, Samson* has been reunited with his family.

The tracing team were able to locate Samson's* relatives living in a small, remote village in Western Uganda. The family were so happy to know that Samson*, now aged 15, was safe and healthy. Samson* is now living with his relatives in Western Uganda.





Skilling

Our skilling projects are vital to breaking the cycle of poverty for families in Kampala. In the wake of COVID-19, our vocational training is needed more than ever to ensure families can recover their incomes and have hope for the future.

The COVID-19 pandemic meant that many families were left without an income. Most people living in Kampala's slum communities rely on informal labour, such as work on a market stall or street stands. The money they make that day is used to buy the food they eat that evening. When lockdown hit and everyone was told to stay at home, they lost everything overnight.

Our skilling projects train our communities to learn either sewing, knitting, tailoring or carpentry, and key business skills so that learners can go on to start their own businesses or seek more stable employment. Due to this, the demand for our skilling projects has been at an all-time high, and we have been able to skill more people than ever before.

- In 2021, we provided vocational skills training to 160 people
- 153 people graduated from our tailoring and knitting course
- 7 young people graduated from our carpentry course
- 26 sewing machines were generously donated and shipped to Kampala







I knew nothing about tailoring but in the last 4 months, I have been trained. I am proud to say that I can make a number of different fashions and designs of my own. The training has helped a lot in building my confidence. I can now handle customers in the best way possible because I now have what it takes to satisfy their needs. 
Simon* was unemployed and facing lots of financial difficulties when he enrolled on our Tailoring course. He hoped that by learning a vocational skill he would be able to earn a sustainable income to support himself. While on the course Simon* learnt how to make many kinds of clothes, like shirts, trousers, dresses and different types of skirts.

After graduating from the Tailoring course, Simon* secured a job at a local company contracted to make surgical gowns for government hospitals. On days when they are not busy making the gowns, Simon* earns an extra income from sewing jackets which he supplies to a friend downtown for sale. Simon* told us that he's glad to be earning a decent income and living more comfortably than before thanks to the skills he obtained from the project.

Miles In Their Shoes

Miles in Their Shoes was back for a second year. In February, a corporate team of 125 took on the Miles in Their Shoes challenge and raised over £30,000! Then, in June, 29 brave trekkers set off on their virtual journey from Birmingham to Kampala and raised £6,931. Thank you to all those who took part in the challenge this year. Serving Communities in Crisis

We launched our Serving Communities in Crisis emergency appeal in response to the third wave of COVID-19 in Uganda. Another lockdown resulted in school closures, families left without an income, parents struggling to afford food for their kids and cases of neglect and abuse increasing. Kampala was in crisis. You, our wonderful supporters, donated over £11,032, giving our communities the safety nets they needed when they were left without incomes.



The Ball of Hope

In November we welcomed Kids Club Kampala supporters to our first inperson event in almost 2 years. It was wonderful to be able to catch up and meet the supporters who had been there for our communities living in Kampala's slums. We had a fantastic time at the ball with live music, a silent auction and games.

A massive thank you to all those who attended the event and helped us to raise £15,472!



We were completely blown away by the support received for our 2021 Big Give campaign, raising an incredible £26,891 for our Encouraging Education Project. As part of this year's campaign, we hosted our virtual Big Give Bash. This was a joyous celebration of all things Uganda. We had traditional music, dancing and games and transported our supporters to Kampala. Thank you to everyone who supported our Big Give Christmas Challenge!






Financial Review
